Discussion – French Flag and Eiffel Tower

Notes: French Flag

The blue, white, and red French flag took shape during the French Revolution. The three colors represent the Republic's three ideals: Liberty, Equality and Fraternity

The traditional emblem of France was the fleur-de-lis, or lily, which first appeared on the arms in the 12th century.

Notes: Eiffel Tower

The Eiffel Tower is probably one of the most famous symbols of France. It was built in 1889 for an exhibition. The tower was thought to be only a temporary structure, although it still stands today. The tower is 300 metres tall, (986 feet), not including the television antenna on top, which adds another 20 meters

Notes – Bastille Day/Fete Nationale

Bastille Day, the French national holiday, commemorates the storming of the Bastille, which took place 219 years ago. The Bastille was a prison and a symbol of power held by King Louis. By capturing this symbol, the people marked the fact that the King no longer had the power.

Discussion – Hygiene and safety in the kitchen

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BASE 1 – French Impressionism

Equipment: Paper, Paint, Brushes, Water Containers, Fruit Bowl

Method: Each Cub Scout is to attempt to paint a bowl of fruit or similar item

BASE 2 – Tour De France

Equipment: Ropes, chairs, hoops

Method: Each Cub to have a turn at being timed around the obstacle course.

BASE 3 – Escargot

Equipment: Tape, chalk, stones

Method: Escargot is a different version of Hop Scotch. Children draw a snail-shaped course in chalk, with the numbers increasing toward the center. Unlike American hopscotch, children playing escargot do not use a stone or marker. Rather, each player simply hops on the selected foot toward the center. A player loses his turn if he touches any lines or hops in a square more than once. Once a player hops all the way to the center and back out again, she may choose one square as her "house" and place her initials in it. This square becomes a resting place for her so she can take a break mid-turn; other players must avoid the square by hopping over it. All players can rest in the center square. When the board is so full of players' "houses" that players can no longer make it to the center, the player who has claimed the most squares wins.

BASE 4 – Pancakes

Equipment: Self Raising Flour, Salt, Sugar, Eggs, Milk, Butter, Food Colouring, Maple Syrup, Ice Cream, Frypan, Egg Flips, Paper plates, Tea Towels, Paper Towel

Method:

Beat 1 Egg and 1 cup of Milk together until smooth

Place 2 cups of self raising flour, $\frac{1}{4}$ teaspoon of salt and 1 tablespoon of sugar in a bowl.

Mix egg, milk and dry ingredients together until batter is thick but still a bit runny

Heat pan to 350F and grease well

Drop Spoonfuls of the batter onto the hot pan. When the tiny bubbles burst turn them over to cook the other side.

Server with Butter, Maple Syrup and Ice Cream
